









2008 d'ARENBERG THE HERMIT CRAB VIOGNIER MARSANNE

WINEMAKER: Chester Osborn

REGION: McLaren Vale (92%), Adelaide Hills (8%), South Australia

VARIETALS: Viognier (72%), Marsanne (28%)
MATURATION: 4% in older French oak barriques

ALCOHOL: 13.5% alc/vol | 8.6 g/L TA | 3.38 pH

THE ART OF BEING DIFFERENT:

Many of McLaren Vale's vineyards are on free-draining soils underlain with limestone, formed by the calcareous remains of the local marine fauna. One such creature is the Hermit Crab, a reclusive little creature that inhabits the cast-off shells of others. Thus the Osborn family thought the name appropriate for this blend, as it is best enjoyed with shellfish and seafood dishes.

VINTAGE NOTES:

2008 was a fabulous vintage for whites due to the intensity of flavor and ripeness achieved at high levels of natural acidity. Spring delivered average conditions with strong canopy growth due to adequate rainfall, keeping the vines stress free through veraison to harvesting. Harvest began early, but thanks to the cool weather experienced through February the wines retained abundant natural acidity while benefiting from superb ripening conditions.

TASTING NOTES:

Expressive aromatics of lime and lemon with peaches, pears and apricot stone jumping out of the glass and spicy, floral notes in the background. Great balance on the palate, the luscious stone fruit and ginger spices harmonized with Marsanne's savory nutty characters. Wonderful combination of freshness, complexity and balance between fruit flavor, acid and alcohol.
