









2012 HAZARD HILL SEMILLON SAUVIGNON BLANC

WINEMAKER: Cath Oates

REGION: Western Australia: Sauvignon Blanc - Great Southern,

Semillon - Blackwood and Geographe regions

VARIETALS: 48% Semillon, 37% Sauvignon Blanc, 15% Riesling

ANALYSIS: 13.5 alc/vol | 6.8 g/L TA | 3.4 pH

VINTAGE REPORT:

A mild and wet spring and early summer contributed to some disease pressure throughout the region. A generally warm and dry February and March reduced this disease pressure and allowed fruit to ripen steadily and good flavors to develop. A hot spell at the beginning of March brought the white varieties up to optimum maturity for harvesting. Harvest started on the 10th February with Semillon from Geographe and finished 14th March with Sauvignon from Mt Barker.

WINEMAKING:

Semillon Sauvignon Blanc is the quintessential Western Australian blend with a nod to Bordeaux. While the wine's quality is shaped by how the fruit ripens on the vine, the winemaking is simply about the preservation of flavors and locking in the freshness through gentle anaerobic handling, cool fermentation and a light filtration into bottle.

Semillon's lemon character is lifted and complemented by the grassy gooseberry notes of Sauvignon Blanc and the palate weight of Semillon is enhanced by the Sauvignon Blanc's tighter linear structure. The supple juicy mid palate has delicious racy lemon and grapefruit flavors with a minerally counterpoint. Lovely balance, harmonious and round but finishing with crisp clean finish and lovely long flavors. The punchy, grassy nature of the Pemberton fruit shines through this blend.

A B O U T P L A N T A G E N E T: An historic producer, Plantagenet Wines was the first winery to be established in Western Australia's Great Southern wine region. Named after the local Shire of Plantagenet, the winery was founded in 1968 when English immigrant Tony Smith identified the potential of these wild and remote lands by planting vines on his Mount Barker property. His initial plantings impressed, producing Rhône-style Shirazes and stylish Cabernet Sauvignons, soon to be joined by Pinot Noir, Riesling and Chardonnay. These aromatic varieties thrived in the cool, continental climate, and Plantagenet has gone on to become one of the leading names in the region, as well as a driving force in establishing the Great Southern as a distinctive, quality-focused Australian wine region.
