


2010 LA SOURCE BORDEAUX BLANC

Review Summary



89 pts - Very Good “This pitch black colored Bordeaux blend opens with a mild blueberry bouquet. On the palate, this wine is medium bodied, balanced and very easy to drink. The flavor profile of this friendly wine is a tasty mild blueberry with hints of gentle oak and faint black current in the background. The finish is dry and its fine tannins linger for quite some time. This crowd pleasing quaffer is very food friendly and would pair well with lots of foods. I would pick Theresa’s homemade meatloaf.”

“...this wine exudes elegance, sophistication and confidence. The color is very pale gold with a faint greenish sheen; notes of lychee, lemongrass, lime peel and limestone teem in the bouquet, with hints of fig, thyme and tarragon coming underneath. From start to finish, the wine is characterized by intense and penetrating limestone and flint minerality and piercing acidity; yes, it’s dry as a bone, with a big bit of grapefruit and grapefruit rind asperity, yet the texture is lovely, ethereal, almost talc-like in effect, so there’s intriguing balance between vivacious crispness and soft evanescence. On the other hand, the finish is packed with minerals and concludes with a fillip of grapefruit bitterness... Don’t waste this wine as an aperitif, though it delivers many charms; its complexity really demands fish or seafood.”
