




2011 YERINGBERG CABERNET BLEND

Review Summary



95 pts “A 56/15/14/8/7% blend of Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Merlot, Malbec and Petit Verdot. A true 'vineyard' wine: if the fruit is in good condition it is picked and included in the wine without any blending trials, notwithstanding that each variety is separately fermented and matured in barrel. It has excellent color for the vintage, and has a deliciously juicy, supple, ultra-smooth light- to medium-bodied palate - one of the best '11 reds of any description from the Yarra Valley.”

There are roses that are darker than its ruby color, though they would not likely share the same persistence of flavor – a mix of fresh herbs, paprika, violets and wild strawberries. Think of a supple Loire Valley cabernet franc and decant the bottle for steak frites.”

90 pts “Deep ruby. Blackberry, sassafras, toasty oak and rose oil on the perfumed nose. Juicy, spicy and light on its feet, with zesty acidity lifting bitter cherry, licorice and peppery spice flavors. Starts off tight but gains flesh and sweetness with air time. Finishes with a light dusting of tannins and very good, smoky persistence. I also had the chance to taste the 2004 version of this wine—it bears an uncanny resemblance to a serious Graves of similar age, with impressive energy and a smoky, spicy, red fruit character; it's drinkable now but appears to have plenty of life left in it.”
