Pinot Noir (Clones: Abel, 10 bar 5, Pommard, 115, 667) 9 months in 100% French oak barriques (25% new)

VINEYARD: The Tosq Vineyard is tucked into a corner of Central Otago's Pisa District and is farmed organically (certified by Biogro, NZ) by the Thompson family. Here, Pinot Noir is planted on a small glacial terrace, a step up from the valley floor and gently sloping to the north and east. Trellising is VSP, the vines are cane pruned and the soils are principally schist-derived fine sandy loams over gravel. Due to its low fertility, the use of compost and other organic inputs are essential well aligned with Central Otago's dry growing seasons.

WINEMAKING: After hand sorting the fruit at the winery, 50% was gently crushed while the other 50% was kept as whole bunches before being transferred to four ton open fermenters. Fermentation took place using indigenous yeasts with regular drains and returns and when required, punch downs. The wine was pressed into 25% new, 25% second use and 50% seasoned French oak barriques for maturation and malolactic fermentation. After nine months the wine was bottled without fining or filtration.

TASTING NOTES: This bright and expressive Pinot leads with dark cherry, plum and undertones of thyme characters. Toasted oak notes impart a nice mouthfeel against the generous palate through a long finish. Undeniably approachable and will mature gracefully over the next ten years.

With winemaking footprints in Burgundy, Willamette Valley, Central Otago and Tasmania, they champion many unsung growers who have farmed their vineyards for decades and generations, some mere feet away from more illustriously cited neighbors.
